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COURSE DESCRIPTION

Survey of theater including its history, dramatic works, stage techniques, production procedures, and relation to other art forms. Participation in productions may be required.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

Students successfully completing this course will be able to: Upon successful completion of this course, students will:

Analyze theater through written responses to play texts and/or live performance.

Demonstrate a basic knowledge of theater history and dramatic works.

Describe the collaborative nature of theater arts.

Demonstrate the relationship of the arts to everyday life as well as broader historical and social contexts.

Core Objectives

This course fulfills three hours of the Creative Arts requirement in the Midland College Core Curriculum. The Core Curriculum is a set of courses that provide students with a foundation of knowledge, skills, and educational experiences that are essential for all learning.

Creative Arts courses focus on the appreciation and analysis of creative artifacts and works of the human imagination. They involve the synthesis and interpretation of artistic expression and enable critical, creative, and innovative communication about works of art. As part of the core, this course addresses the following four Creative Arts core objectives:

- **Critical Thinking Skills:** to include creative thinking, innovation, inquiry, and analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information. Critical Thinking will be addressed through the evaluation, comparison, and analysis of historical periods, aesthetic principles, and artistic genres.

- **Communication Skills:** to include effective written, oral, and visual communication. Communications Skills will be addressed through the students' expression of informed opinions, researched ideas, and visual presentations.
- **Teamwork:** to include the ability to consider different points of view and to work effectively with others to support a shared purpose or goal. Teamwork will be addressed through the collaborative work between students.
- **Social Responsibility:** to include intercultural competence, knowledge of civic responsibility, and the ability to engage effectively in regional, national, and global communities. Social Responsibility will be addressed through the study of the artistic, historical, and cultural diversity of artists.

Class Participation – Continual and effective class participation factors include, but may not be limited to: joining the class discussions, performing exercises with commitment, regular and timely class attendance, and completion of scheduled and unscheduled assignments.

Extra Credit – Available ONLY for those who have completed all other assignments. Extra credit is meant to assist those with low grades, but not to assist those who missed assignments or have poor attendance. Students may not use hours or assignments from other classes towards extra credit in this class. All extra credit work is due by the

start of the last class. **Maximum of two extra credit reviews.** **Additional Reviews** of productions seen will be accepted on an ungraded, 25 points per review basis. A program or ticket stub must be attached to the back of all extra credit reviews.

EXAMINATIONS

Quizzes – 5 multi-chapter quizzes (20 questions) will be given during the semester.

Midterm – Questions over the lectures and chapters assigned up to midterm.

Final – Questions covering all chapters, the plays, videos and lectures.

WRITTEN WORK

Written Work – All written work must be typed - hand-written papers will NOT be accepted. Margins should be one inch on all sides. Papers are to be left justified only. Pages must be stapled together. All assignments **must** have your name in the upper right hand corner of the first page of the paper. Assignments will be accepted as an e-mail attachment in **Microsoft Word format only** (no Word Perfect).

Your Class Participation grade will be lowered on the following scale:

- * 10 points for each quiz not take on or before the assigned date
- * 20 points if the Midterm is not taken on or before the assigned date
- * 20 points for each written assignment not turned in on or before the assigned date

Keep a copy of written assignments and graded assignments. Any assignment not turned in at the start of class on the day that it is due will be considered late. Late assignments may receive only half credit, and will only be accepted within a week of the assignment due date.

Assignments and exams will be graded on a sliding scale in terms of quality, content, spelling, grammar and adherence to formatting rules. Receiving all points for an assignment is equal to getting a score of 100%.
